Sustainable Development

Introduction to the theme of the unit

- 1. *Sustainable development* is a development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the needs of future generations.
- 2. *Basic elements of development*: good infrastructure, high percentage of literacy, strong economy, advanced science and technology, social justice, etc
- 3. *Negative sides of development:* pollution, stress, decrease of nature and increase of building, people become more materialist, etc
- 4. "Think globally act locally": It means to see the big picture, but do your part to make it happen on a smaller scale. For example: <u>Think globally</u>, Take into consideration pollution which affects the world. <u>Act locally</u>, reduce your carbon footprint at home and protect green areas. You usually cannot affect the world unless you first affect your local situation.

Metaphors and Similes

1. *A simile* is a figure of speech where <u>somebody or something is compared to somebody or something else</u>, using the words 'as' or 'like'.

For Example: the frightened child was as quite as a mouse. ; Her face is like a moon.

- 2. *A metaphor* expresses that <u>somebody or something is somebody or something else</u>, but it does **not use** 'like' or 'as'.
- **For example**: time is money. ; Sawsan's success is the fruit of her hard work

How to write a film review

A good film review must contain these four elements

a. credits and recommendation
b. plot and characters
c. evaluation and last analysis
d. conclusion

A. Credits and recommendation:

In the introduction you have to write:

- 1. Credits:
- > Title and year
- > Genre: comedy, drama, horror, adventure film, thriller, science fiction, love story, ...
- > Director

2. Recommendation:

State the reasons why your reader(s) should watch the movie.

B. Plot:

In the body, you have to write the synopsis or summary of the plot. Make sure that your summary makes sense to a reader who does not know the movie. Do not refer to specific scenes and do not try to explain everything.

- You must also include the next items, but not as different parts.
- 1. *Place and time:* Where does the action take place? When does the action take place? (present time, 19th century...)
- 2. Background: society, country, kind of people (age, culture social class...), historical time...

Characters:

- **1.** physical description
- 2. psychological description
- 3. age, nationality, social/personal background, etc

C. Evaluation and last analysis

- What message is being told? What was the director's purpose or intention or the theme of the film?
- Compare with other realities you know (your country, historical fact or event, other film from the same director or genre...)

D. Conclusion:

Write a conclusion and express your opinion about the film.

FILM REVIEW WRITING SAMPLE:

TWILIGHT

Twilight is a 126-min romance fantasy *written by* Melissa Rosenberg, *directed by* Catherine Hardwicke, and *produced by* Mark Morgan. *It was released* in November 2008.

The film is set in Washington and Arizona. *It stars* a teenager (Kristen Stewart) and a vampire (Robert Pattinson). *It tells the story of* a high-school girl and a mysterious vampire. The two fall in love, but they have to overcome social pressure and other obstacles to take a chance be together.



Kirsten's acting was impressive in the film, and Robber's performance was captivating.
